





Seeds for the Journey

We are living in a secularized society that continues to squeeze Christianity to the limits or completely out of engagement with Jesus and the Church. Baptized Catholics are being lost at an alarming rate. They are now considered former Catholics and most of them are "nones", a term used for people with no religious affiliation.

It is sad to report that children are leaving the Church after preparing for and celebrating the sacraments of initiation, and after years of Catholic School or religious education classes. Mass attendance is down. Those that make up the "nones" are roughly 23 % of the U.S. adult population.

Adults, especially young adults are more likely to say they have no religious affiliation than in past generations. Also those that are baptized and in Junior and Senior High are increasingly stopping to self -identify as Christians and grouping themselves among the "Nones."

It is amazing to me that even though we spend many years studying our faith it takes life experiences to understand the message of Jesus. We spend our life just scratching the surface. One of the exciting aspects of the Catholic Church tradition is that we have over 2,000 years of reflecting on the wonderful teachings of Christ and the experience of the disciples and have only begun to understand. Once in a while we come across people in our lives that show us a glimpse of how true faith is lived.

At the same time we are losing Catholics at an alarming rate, we are blessed with an incredibly generous group of faithful who are willing to serve as Catechists. This week we celebrate Catechetical Sunday. Catechetical Sunday is a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the role that each person plays, by virtue of his or her Baptism, in handing on the faith and being a witness to the Gospel. It is a chance for all to rededicate themselves to this mission as a community of faith.

"A catechist is a person who facilitates the process of faith formation, first by echoing the word of God in his or her own life and second by helping others to do so." (Joe Paprocki) All Christians are catechists in some way, whether as a parent, sibling, co-worker, or friend. And all Christians are also "students/disciples" as we continue to be formed in our faith throughout our lives in community with one another.

Faith is a great mystery we need to dwell with. We need to stay with it, live it, feel it, and never think that we have uncovered it all. The core of faith is believing, even when we don't see or know the answer. We can spend a lifetime with our faith without ever really grasping it. Conversion is a lifelong process.

This week we call forward those who have accepted the role as catechists for our children, youth, and adults to be commissioned and blessed for their ministry. Catechists share their faith, share their experience with God. They will take those in their responsibility on a faith journey and will walk with them along the pathway to a closer relationship with God. And, on that journey, they will also grow in their own faith.

We give thanks to God for these dedicated people who have stepped forward and said "Yes" to the call to serve our community in this special way. May this new year of faith be a time of renewal of a relationship with Jesus for all of us.

Titurgical Corner

A continuation of the Structure of the Eucharistic Celebration-Mass



Eucharistic Prayer General Overview/Historical factors:

There is almost universal agreement that the origins of the Eucharistic prayer are to be found in a series of table prayers required at every Jewish meal. These assumed the greatest importance on such holy days as the feast of the Passover. Toward the beginning of the meal the father of the family or the presiding member of the community uttered a Jewish prayer of blessing, known in Hebrew as a berakah, which blessed or praised God. Holding the bread the presider prayed: "Blessed are you, Lord, our God, king of the world, who has brought the bread from heaven." The bread was then broken and distributed to those present. The various courses of the meal followed, with the Passover meal being distinguished by special foods, prayers, and recitation of the haggadah Proclamation/Jewish text that sets forth the order of Passover Seder). The latter interpreted the special meaning of the feast as one which made present God's liberating deeds of the past and applied their power to those celebrating the feast. Toward the end of the meal and over a cup of wine the presider said another though more solemn and extensive berakah (blessing) creation, especially the creation of life. The second was a thanksgiving for the whole which, after an initial dialogue, consisted of three sections. The first praised God for all history of salvation, i.e. for a desirable and ample land, for the covenant, for the law. The third section was a supplication that God's creative and redemptive action be continued and renewed, especially in the coming of the Messiah and in the restoration of the house of David. On certain festive occasions this section was expanded by a request that God accept the "remembrance" of His people, i.e. that God, ever faithful to his covenant, might continue to renew His great deeds.

Kelly, Matthew **Resisting Happiness**

If you have ever tried to accomplish anything worthwhile, then you've been face-to-face with resistance. Kelly defines resistance as the feeling of not wanting to do something you know is good for you and instead wanting to do something you know is not good for you. It is the tendency to delay something you should be doing right now. It stands between you and happiness. He asks us to think about the four words that embody the Christian life: "Thy will be done." He encourages us to invite God into the center of our decision-making process. To seek his will in all things.
