




The Eyes of the Beholder

I wanted so much to write this article without mentioning the situation in our world. If you could have told me even two months ago the horror we've witnessed, the changes in our way of living, the feelings that we're experiencing, I would've told you, "I don't believe it." "Could never happen." I'd have to see it to believe it." "Not in our time." BUT, we are living history in the making — never been seen or done before! Unknown territory. I, for one, am empathizing with poor Thomas in today's Gospel reading.

Let's go back two months ago. Personally, my life was very stressful. I was tremendously busy, so much to do, balancing personal life with family, preparing for classes and Lenten activities, money worries, technology challenges, health concerns, negative vibes in the media regarding the economy, the election, the scandals, the lies, the latest accusations... exhausting.

So, in the midst of this pandemic, what's changed for me? My mantra has always been, "Find Joy." Where have I found joy? For one thing, prayer is a given now. The innumerable times I'm experiencing the kindness of my friends and neighbors, I say a prayer of gratitude for them. When I watch the courage and selflessness of medical professionals and their families, I say a prayer of gratitude and petition for strength for them. When I hear of the terrible stories of casualties due to the virus, I say a prayer of sympathy and comfort for the suffering.

And believe it or not, I've found technology to be a lifesaver both in my prayer experiences and in everyday life. I was blest to be a part of the drive through Adoration at St. Paul's. I prayed the stations with Pope Francis, took part in Sunday Masses with my family in Minnesota and California, participated in Holy Week liturgies with Fr. Paul and Deacon Mark. Connecting with the Confirmation youth and their families via emails and phone calls is providing a supportive network for us with a common goal of growing in faith. Pure joy!

And despite some big bumps such as family health concerns, tele-visits with physicians and conference calls with family on Zoom have been calming and encouraging. Despite isolation, visits with my NY family and friends while observing the social distancing guidelines in my garage and back yard are true gifts. Phone calls, friendly waves from passers-by, smiles of essential workers, hearing the familiar "Stay well", uplifting and funny messages on social media – all these...bring joy!

Tell me two months ago, that I would be writing about this...I would never have believed you. Like St. Thomas, I would have demanded visual and physical proof. Through this unbelievable life experience, I know Jesus is alive. Like Thomas, many of us need the physical body present, right in front of us. So...where is He in this nightmare? Open the eyes of your hearts and see some amazing things. See the loving Christ in the kindness of others, know the healing Christ in the unselfish work of medical professionals, observe the teaching Christ in the tireless efforts of educators and government officials. Find the joy of the living Christ in each other, in the simple beauty of nature, in the very fact that you are alive.

As I write this today, the news is cautiously hopeful, horrific death tolls are lessening, new cases of COVID-19 are fewer. My prayer is, with the help of God, as we slowly work our way back to life without COVID-19, we never forget this time of kindness, unselfish service, sacrifice, mutual respect and love for ourselves and others. With Jesus Christ, anything is possible. May we be filled with His joy. Amen.



Masks are Needed at Catholic Family Center

Catholic Family Center has been absolutely blown away by the response we've received from the community to our call for help with masks! It has been humbling and inspiring to see how much people want to help in any way they can. The number of people who either volunteered or spread the word to others who could, has made this successful. We have people from all over the country making masks for us, showing both us and those we serve love and appreciation. Of our original 400 mask goal, we have collected over 500 masks!!!

With the CDC and New York State urging everyone to use a mask in public, our need has doubled. Our current goal is 800 masks and it may increase as we hear from more of our senior and medically fragile community members in need.

Therefore, Catholic Family Center once again raise the call for anyone who is able to make masks to please do so. There have been a lot of questions if it is okay to use a different pattern – the answer is absolutely! We've actually heard that there is an elastic shortage and that many people prefer the option to tie behind their head instead of the elastic that can irritate the skin of some. Please stay as true to a pattern as possible, but small adjustments are completely fine.

 S. Avenue. Phone 325-5260. Call when you arrive as doors are locked.
- St. Joseph's Church in Penfield, 43 Gebhardt Rd. Hours are 8:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m., follow the Penfield Hope signs and there is a bin a the front door.
- St. Catherine's of Siena located at 26 Mendon lona Rd. Hours are 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. daily, there is a bin located in the chapel located to the right of the church. Bin is on left when you enter.
- Sacred Heart Cathedral, located at 296 Flower City Park, Monday-Friday 9:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m.; There is a bin on the north side of the building (Ridgeway Ave side) under the portico.





GOSPEL MEDITATIONEncourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture

A person was going through a very dark time, questioning the meaning of life, not feeling very purposeful or worthwhile, and feeling disconnected and unappreciated. Suddenly, they gazed up at the night sky, found themselves in awe of all the stars and constellations, and exclaimed, "I am here on purpose and I am loved!" Having been brought by God to this moment of intense connection and awareness, his life changed from that moment on.

If we are always preoccupied with the challenges, obligations, and stuff of daily life, we can easily miss the wonderful opportunities when the resurrected Christ is knocking at our door. If we open ourselves to the fullness of experience, we will find ourselves listening and embracing all that is around us, being caught up in the magnificence of creation's grandeur and knowing in our heart and soul that God is and I am.

While that sounds like a simple, tell-me-something-I don't-know kind of revelation, it is life changing when it takes root in the depth of a person's soul. Stumbling upon this awesome truth and internalizing it doesn't require an assent of the mind. It beckons for a claim on our soul. We find ourselves knowing something profound that cannot be explained or reasoned, but purely is. When we are caught up in an experience and encounter the truth, it doesn't matter how all of the pieces got put together. Truth is simply truth. The "my Lord and my God" responses we utter are not evoked because all of the pieces of faith and life make reasonable sense. The "my Lord and my God" affirmations come when we are lifted up out of our preoccupations and silliness and are in the presence of mystery and mercy.

God is mystery, one who is beyond our grasp but at the same time within our reach, knowable yet unknowable. And when in the presence of mystery, there comes an intense experience of mercy. We know deep within the essence of ourselves — and in the very life of creation — this beating, unconditionally accepting, life-sustaining, profound, mysterious yet familiar presence of love. We have found our peace. "Peace be with you." Breathe in and breathe out. Peace.
