



* * Seeds for the Journey ** ****** Mary's Battle Cry for Justice In today's Gospel we are treated to Mary's hymn of praise to God for the wondrous work he is accomplishing within her, body and soul. Mary's words erupt spontaneously from her heart when she is called blessed by her cousin Elizabeth, the expectant mother of John the Baptist. Mary's praise to God is not premeditated; she is the orator of strong, passionate, bold words that dare to predict a just future, a "reversal of fortune," when the oppressed shall be lifted up and the powerful cast down. Recognizing the revolutionary nature of Mary's song, the German theologian Dietrich Bon-****** * hoeffer, before being executed by the Nazis, spoke these words in a sermon during Advent 1933: * "The song of Mary is the oldest Advent hymn. It is at once the most passionate, the wildest, one might even say the most revolutionary Advent hymn ever sung. This is not the gentle, tender, dreamy Mary * whom we sometimes see in paintings....This song has none of the sweet, nostalgic, or even playful tones of some of our Christmas carols. It is instead a hard, strong, inexorable song about the power of ****** God and the powerlessness of humankind." * It is understandable, then, that throughout history marginalized people have identified with Mary's song while their oppressors and abusers have banned it for being subversive. When the British ruled * 💥 India, they forbade the Magnificat to be recited in the Catholic churches. During the 1980s, the Guate-* 💥 malan government feared that recitation of the Magnificat was emboldening the Guatemalan poor to * believe that change was possible and that it was coming, so they banned the public recitation of * ** Mary's song. * # In Argentina, during the late 1970s and into the 1980s, the "Mothers of the Plaza de Mayo"—whose children were "disappeared" by the ruling military junta that terrorized Argentineans with unspeaka-******** ble human rights abuses—protested every week in the public square in front of the presidential palace * in Buenos Aires. They carried their revolutionary cry on posters: "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in God my Savior, for he has been mindful of the humble state of his servant...." The jun-* ta's response was to outlaw any public display of the Magnificat. ********* What are they all so afraid of? They are afraid of the power of Mary, whose soul magnifies the Lord. Be afraid, because Mary also empowers. ***** Sue * *

Registration is OPEN For Grades K-7

SOR will be back in session September 25th & 26th. This year the Diocese has included grades 6 & 7 in the SOR program replacing Youth Group.

Grades K-6: Faith Formation (SOR) classes will begin on Sunday September 26, 2021 continuing with remote at home learning overseen by a volunteer teacher (Catechist) who will contact you directly to set up times for class via Zoom.

Grade 2: In addition to Faith Formation (SOR), there will be 2 books to study with parents for preparing to receive the *Sacraments of 1st Penance* (*Reconciliation or Confession*) and **1st Eucharist** (Holy Communion).

Grade 7: Faith Formation (SOR) will begin on Saturday September 25, 2021 with on-site learning from 3-4pm with a volunteer teacher (Catechist). Room 6 is set up with chairs distanced and masks will be required.

GOSPEL:


