



Seeds for the Journey

Two Women Who Changed Jesus' Mind

This Saturday is the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and when we celebrate it as a Holy Day we are treated to a meditation on the Magnificat of Mary in the Gospel reading. The Sunday after is the 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time, and the Gospel reading for that day shows Jesus healing the daughter of a Canaanite woman. Both women play a pivotal role in revealing and advancing the mission of Jesus in moments when he seems set on another course. They changed his mind.

You'll recall how at the wedding at Cana, when Jesus' mother approaches him with her not-so-subtle encouragement to do something about the diminishing wine supply, Jesus rejects the idea with the words, "How does your concern affect me? My hour has not yet come." In spite of her dismissal, Mary instructs the servers to do whatever Jesus asks them to do. He asks them to bring jars filled with water—they bring six (holding 20-30 gallons each), their contents now miraculously containing wine, and the wedding guests enjoy the best wine they've had all evening! And so begins the public revelation of Jesus.

In today's Gospel reading, after a contentious interaction between Jesus and the scribes and Pharisees who are tracking him, Jesus withdraws into Gentile territory with his disciples for some rest and solitude (The Jews would never follow him there because they considered this an unclean area). A pagan woman searches them out and begs Jesus to heal her daughter, who is sick at home. At first Jesus ignores her pleas and then explains that he is "sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." She persists. He seems to insult her by comparing her people to dogs. She is not deterred; in fact, she turns his argument on its head, which brings Jesus to acknowledge her great faith and how, because of that faith, her daughter has been healed. So now Jesus' mission includes the Gentiles, which, of course, St. Paul is later called to fulfill as one of the Apostles.

In reference to Mary, I'd like to add an excerpt from an essay entitled, "The Value of a Person" by Catholic educator and writer Alice Camille. She explains how the 1950 dogmatic statement of Pope Pius XII on the Assumption of Mary affirmed the dignity and value of every human person in the wake of the unspeakable destruction of life from World War II. You might notice some parallels to the extraordinary time we are living in now:

"The world of 1950 still struggled up from the ashes of a traumatizing global war. An estimated 3 percent of the human population, between seventy and eighty-five million people, lost their lives as a result of World War II. Civilian deaths were double the military losses: due to war crimes or war-related diseases and famine. Whole cities lay in ruins. Those who returned home were permanently shattered, adding to the toll the conflict took on the human community. Few neighborhoods on earth were not mourning personal losses. In the aftermath of such horror, 1950 may seem a peculiar moment for a pope to make a dogmatic statement about Mary....[however, in his statement, Pius XII lamented] how cheaply human bodies had been treated, how little a life had been valued. Wasn't it the right moment to affirm that every part of Mary was precious to God? That the body that carries the life of God becomes a holy vessel, never to be discarded? Mary's entire person had been recovered for heaven. Because to the one who created us, flesh and blood is not trash. How might we treat each person today, if we saw them as sacred vessels of God?"

REFLECT

FIRST READING

After Israel's return from their captivity in Babylon, Isaiah prophesied the Lord's salvation to all people of faith and good will, not just Israel. Why do you think some people resist the idea of God's impartiality?

SECOND READING

Paul sees the rejection of Jesus by the Jews as the vehicle for God's mercy to all, both Jew and Gentile alike. When has God turned a negative into a positive in your life?

GOSPEL READING

Jesus initially reacts negatively to the Canaanite (Gentile) woman in a manner familiar to most Jews of that day. But Jesus showed the disciples that faith in him transcends the historic divide between Jew and Gentile. When have you allowed your faith in Christ heal a division?
