

Seeds for the Journey



A few weeks ago I saw a heartwarming story on Spectrum News about an anonymous man who bought ice cream for complete strangers at Abbotts on Empire Blvd. During the interview a mom who brought her small child for ice cream after a swim lesson, was talking about her experience and how joyful the atmosphere was because of this act of kindness. As the crowd enjoyed their ice cream, the man sat and observed from his car. As the recipents of this act of kindness said "Thank You" the man had replied "You're Welcome and God Bless."

In this divided world that we live in, all of us are so cautious with being politically correct that you don't often hear "God Bless" outside of your place of worship. For me, that was one of the most touching points of the story. By choosing to say "God Bless" he wanted everyone to know that the root of his kindness came from his faith. I'm sure he didn't want to offend anyone by his comment but he wasn't afraid to mention God in his reply. The anonymous man is like the prophet Jeremiah who we heard about in today's First Reading. Jeremiah chose to follow God at no cost and be a true prophet who shared with those he encountered how to trust in God. Despite the ridicule and the dangers that he faced he still was moved to encourage others to follow God and the Commandments in the way he did.

The anonymous man has inspired me to be more Christ like and give more of myself to those around me. Not to just give to others in a monetary way but to stay centered in my faith by showing kindness, reflection and praying more to let others see Christ in me.

"Lord Jesus, may your love consume me and transform my life that I may truly desire nothing more than life with you. Make me strong in love and fidelity that nothing may hinder me from doing your will." Amen.

Health Ministry

Part of our mission statement here at St. Paul's directs us to love our neighbor as our self. I would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone about an important way in which all of us can put this mission statement into action... getting vaccines.

An internet search about vaccines can bombard the reader with an enormous amount of information, some true and some not true. I would like those of you reading this article to remember three important points.

- 1.) Vaccines are safe, and they are effective at preventing diseases.
- 2.) Diseases like Measles, Mumps, and Whooping Cough were almost non-existent in this country, until recently. Now, these diseases are "making a comeback" because more and more people are refusing to vaccinate themselves and their children.
- 3.) There is a small portion of the population that has medical conditions which prevent them from being able to receive vaccines. These medical conditions also usually weaken the person's immune system. Therefore, if these people with weakened immune systems are exposed to diseases like Measles, they are at risk for catching the disease and suffering complications that could claim their lives.

Jesus tells us that whatever we do to the least of his people, we do unto him. My husband and I, along with our children, are fully vaccinated. I respectfully urge everyone who is able to receive vaccines to do so. By getting vaccinated, you will help to protect those most vulnerable among us, and you will be putting the words of our parish mission statement into action.
