



# *Seeds for the Journey*

This weekend is Public Policy Advocacy Weekend in the Diocese of Rochester. And, since you've been faithfully reading your bulletins, you've seen that we have been providing background information about this year's petition, "Nourish New York," a program designed to help address the needs of families suffering from food insecurity.

Food insecurity, as I'm sure you are aware, is a global problem, affecting the lives of almost a billion people, including millions of people in the U.S. By definition food insecurity refers to a family's lack of access to the nutritionally adequate food necessary for an active, healthy life. In New York State alone over two million people suffer from food insecurity, including over ninety three thousand in Monroe County. Unfortunately, this crisis has been greatly exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic, impacting the lives of farmers as well as thousands of families that did not struggle to access food prior to the pandemic.

To address the issue of food insecurity Governor Cuomo established the Nourish New York initiative, a program designed to "help people who are food insecure to access the nourishment that they need, while providing a market for farmers to sell their products" (<https://agriculture.ny.gov/NourishNY>). According to the 2021 Diocesan Public Policy agenda "the initiative provides funding to Food Banks to purchase New York State-produced farm products. This accomplishes two goals: it offers market support to farmers, the fishing community, and food processors who have been impacted by the economic effects of the pandemic, while getting high-quality food to individuals and families in communities across the state through the regional Food Banks and local food pantries."

To date, the Nourish New York initiative has provided ~ \$35 million in funding, and 4,152 New York farms have provided millions of pounds of food to New Yorkers in-need.

While the Nourish New York initiative ended December 31, 2020, the Church believes it is imperative that the program continues, especially as the COVID crisis continues to cause economic hardship. To that end, the Bishops of the Archdiocese of New York are requesting that state leaders provide \$50 million for state fiscal year 2021-22 to make Nourish New York an ongoing program to meet the needs of farmers and those suffering from food insecurity.

What can we do? How can we reach out in love to farmers and families in need? By signing the Diocese of Rochester Public Policy petition! ### How long does it take to figure out a light bulb?

You may have heard a joke about how many people it takes to replace a light bulb. Our experience with our votives has a similar tone.

We received the votive stands last March and introduced them and our statue of Mary to the parish when we reopened in June. Many have visited the corner to say a prayer and light a candle.

The candles were gently used when we got them; there was no user manual. We were told they were "electric" and to turn them off to reset them, at whatever interval we wanted. We chose a week and were resetting each Friday.

As the weeks went by, we started noticing that the candles were turning off on their own. At first we accused each other of resetting them. Only one person should do it!

The next reaction was, they are broken! We spent money on used items that are not working properly. Oh no!

But then, we started to wonder if they were actually "electronic" - a higher end model with a timer built in. Ah ha!

After more research was done, we are now realizing that our candles are not broken and are indeed electronic with a five day timer! So we are not resetting them each Friday any more. You may light a candle any day and it will be on for 5 days!

### Ash Wednesday Masses Wednesday, February 17th



#### Distribution of Ashes

Due to COVID-19, the distribution of ashes will change this year. The sprinkling of dry ashes with an Aspergillum are imposed by making a sign of the cross above the crown of the head as ashes fall upon the hair. This is in accord with the ancient practice of the Church, and remains the practice at the Vatican.

#### Fasting & Abstinence:

Catholics from age 18-59 are to fast on Ash Wednesday and Friday's during Lent. Have one full meal and two smaller meals, with no snacking between meals. Abstinence means Catholics of age 14 and older are to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all Fridays during Lent.



### Invitation to Study the Gospel of John

I'm looking for some folks who would like to study the Gospel of John with me. This would be via a Zoom format once a week, beginning in Lent and continuing through the Easter Season.

As you know, we journey through the three Synoptic Gospels (Matthew, Mark, Luke) during our Sunday readings over a three-year period, while readings from the Gospel of John are reserved for solemnities, Holy Week, and the Easter Season. We are currently in the B Cycle of readings, which pulls from the Gospel of Mark—and, conveniently for this study, John, Chapter 6. So, this year we will get John's perspective on the multiplication of the loaves and fishes, Jesus walking on water, and the Bread of Life Discourse.

Additionally, some of our most beloved Biblical passages are found *only* in the Gospel of John—the marriage at Cana; Jesus' encounters with Nicodemus, the Samaritan woman at the well, and the woman being stoned for adultery; the raising of Lazarus; and Jesus' Farewell Discourses.

I can't think of a better time to meditate on the Jesus of John's Gospel than during the deeper liturgical experiences of Lent, Holy Week, and Easter. Although I will facilitate our meetings, I'm really thinking of this as a group of disciples gathered together "in His name" to study the person and teachings of Jesus. Please know that you do not need to have any particular background or experience with Sacred Scripture. Other than reading the chapters to be discussed, there would not be any homework involved. 


