



Jingle bells and odds and ends!

The Advent/Christmas Season is over for another year! It is a very busy time for everyone. I would like to take this opportunity to thank each and everyone of you for your robust participation at the Masses during the Christmas Season. Every one of you revealed a real love of God and each other by your participation. This is what participation in the liturgy is all about and it also makes my work easier. It would be nice if this was the participation at all liturgies during the year.

I hope everyone received what you wanted for Christmas. Unfortunately, I did not. **All** I wanted for Christmas was new members for the choir. What I got was coal in my stocking – not a single new member. I feel like Santa told me I had been a naughty boy last year. Due to people moving from and leaving St. Paul our numbers have arrived at a low point. If you have sung in a choir or choirs please in the Spirit of Christmas consider joining us in our quest to continue the Music Ministry here at St. Paul.

When considering the beautiful participation during the Christmas season and throughout the year two words come to mind: presence and participation. An understanding and application of these two words are the underlying foundation of our recited and sung liturgies. One has a negative connotation and one has a positive connotation.

It is to be understood that our Church wishes us to recall the fourfold purpose of the sacrifice of the Cross, which is the same purpose as in the Sacrifice of the Mass: (1) adoration, (2) thanksgiving, (3) propitiation, reparation and expiation for our faults and asking for pardon. (4) petition. If we apply presence at Mass this cannot be fulfilled. But, if we apply participation it can. Presence implies being at a function or place but with no activity. If we apply participation it means you are involved in or share in the unfolding of the service. Thus to participate proclaims to God that "His children" love Him.

Our Sunday Mass summarizes all our prayers from the previous week as well as all our efforts and meritorious acts which is proof of goodness and tenderness. Participate not presence! Do we really want to simply be present and miss our Father's love? Participate not presence!

Health Ministry

Part of our mission statement here at St. Paul's directs us to love our neighbor as our self. I would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone about an important way in which all of us can put this mission statement into action... getting vaccines.

An internet search about vaccines can bombard the reader with an enormous amount of information, some true and some not true. I would like those of you reading this article to remember three important points.

- Vaccines are safe, and they are effective at preventing diseases.
- 2.) Diseases like measles, mumps, and whooping cough were almost non-existent in this country, until recently. Now, these diseases are "making a comeback" because more and more people are refusing to vaccinate themselves and their children.
- 3.) There is a small portion of the population that has medical conditions which prevent them from being able to receive vaccines. These medical conditions also usually weaken the person's immune system. Therefore, if these people with weakened immune systems are exposed to diseases like measles, they are at risk for catching the disease and suffering complications that could claim their lives.

Jesus tells us that whatever we do to the least of his people, we do unto him. My husband and I, along with our children, are fully vaccinated. I respectfully urge everyone who is able to receive vaccines to do so. By getting vaccinated, you will help to protect those most vulnerable among us, and you will be putting the words of our parish mission statement into action.


