



Recognize God in Your Ordinary Moments The Steward's Work Is Never Done

Woe to the shepherds who mislead and scatter the flock! When you hear these strong words from the Old Testament, you're probably thinking, thank goodness I don't have any sheep — dodged that bullet. Nobody misled here! No flock scattered on my watch! However, we are all shepherds of a kind, called to tend our own sheep: our families, our parishes, our communities.

But it's exhausting. Don't we all sometimes just want to take a break from being a steward? The excuses are so familiar: we're tired, we've done enough, we've given all we can, what more does the parish (or my spouse, or my kids, or my boss, or my friends, or my community) want? We give ourselves permission to be selfish. So, what if the flock scatters just a little?

Jesus gets that. We can just imagine him weary with exhaustion, can't we? We see him on his boat, attempting to sneak away for a quick break — maybe just a chance to eat a bite of food in peace. He is God, but he was still human, after all. Even the most dedicated shepherds need to sleep. But people couldn't leave him alone. They were hungry for him. They needed what he could offer, and they needed it now.

As tough as it is, that's the example we are tasked with imitating. Everyday Stewardship demands accountability. It demands our showing up even when we are tired. It demands that we look at our lives, our time, our energies, our talents, our hearts, our bank accounts and think: where do I still have more to give?

Sisters of Christ the Light Mission Appeal July 24 & 25



Next weekend we welcome Srs. Kavitha Jaku and Lyssa Mathew from "Sister of Christ the Light".

The mission of the Sisters of Christ the Light was founded by late Most Rev. S.A. Aruliah,

the first Bishop of the Catholic Diocese of Cuddapah, Andhra Pradesh, India. They are a diocesan congregation under the patronage of the Bishop of Cuddapah. They follow the Benedictine spirituality. The Charism of the congregation is to radiate the light of Christ in loving service through a life of contemplation and action in the spirit of St. Benedict, their patron.

The sisters are involved in different apostolic activities like providing education for the poor children, and run boarding and rehabilitation homes for the disadvantaged children who are disabled/mentally challenged orphans and also support women through the different empowerment program.

Their social concern is for the Asha Nilayam Speech & Hearing Impaired School & Rehabilitation Center which was founded in 2009. The school runs classes from 1st grade though 10th grade. Currently there are 250 students registered and they lodge in the rehab center to receive therapy. Children are given food, uniforms, education and basic medical care in addition to speech therapy. All of these services are provide free of charge.

The sisters invite St. Paul's to become a channel of blessings to their speech and hearing impaired children. With our goodness and generosity it will help give children hearing aids, food, clothes, education, speech therapy and medication for a year.

GOSPEL:


