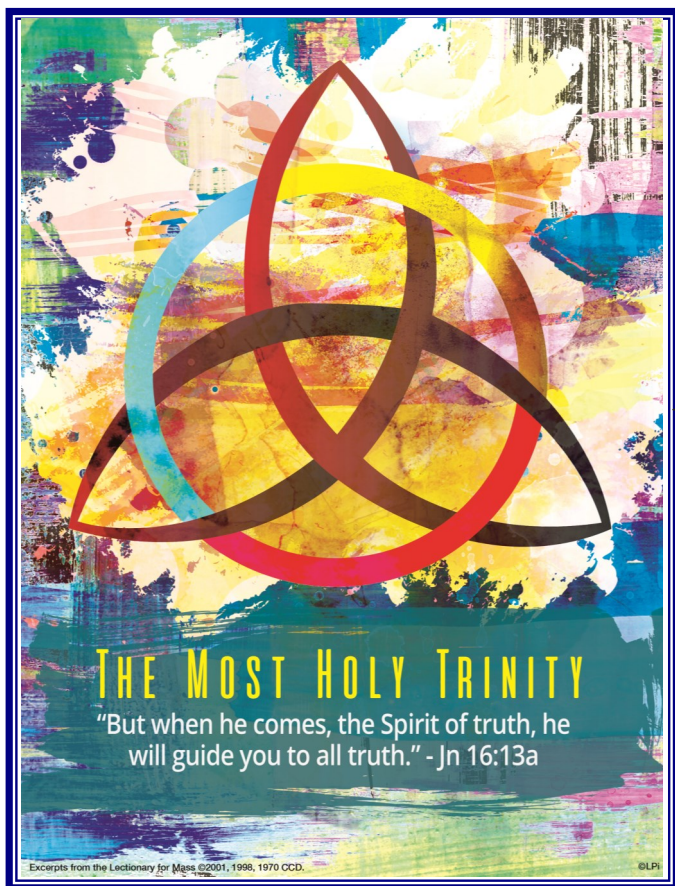

Seeds for the Journey

Eucharist and the Holy Trinity

We cannot fully appreciate the mystery of the Trinity with our minds but we can enter into it! The divine "persons" are in their very nature relationships of infinite self-giving love. The Trinity created us to share in God's own life. We are truly children of God. The creation story in Genesis 1:26 proclaims "Then God said: Let **us** make human beings in our image, after our likeness." Pope Benedict said "The greatest proof that we are all made in the image of the Trinity is that only love makes us happy, because we live to love and be loved".

Living with the Trinity is the most intimate enduring relationship for us because *within* us God dwells (see John 14:23). Wherever one person of the Trinity is, the other two are also present, inseparably united. The Eucharist is an indwelling of the Trinity, not Jesus alone. I believe this gives a Trinitarian meaning to John 14:6. No one can come to the Father except through Jesus because the Trinity is one God.

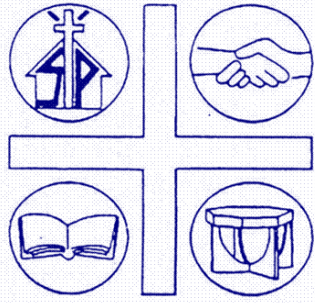
In the Eucharist we are brought into the heart of the Trinity. Communion actualizes the words of Christ, "I am in them and you in me" (John 17:23)... "He who has seen me has seen the Father (John 14:9) and "the one who sent me is with me and has not left me to myself" (John 8:29). The Holy Spirit, who proceeds as love from the abiding union of the Father and the Son also comes to dwell in us. St. Paul tells us "The love of God has been poured out into our hearts through the holy Spirit that has been given to us" (Romans 5:5).

The Spirit sent to us by Christ comes and abides with us. Without the Spirit's presence, we could not ask for Jesus to dwell with us – to "enter under my roof". Listen carefully to the Eucharistic prayer at Mass. You will hear the calling down of the Holy Spirit to bless and transform the gifts of bread and wine to make them holy so they may become the body and blood of Jesus Christ. (This invocation of the Holy Spirit is called the epiclesis.) This Trinitarian prayer is directed to the Father, and calls for Christ's presence, through the power of the Spirit.

The Spirit works in our hearts to open them to the grace of the sacramental body and blood of the Lord. The Spirit draws us, the communicants, into unity – with the Father, Son and all who receive Jesus Christ. St. Paul names this presence "the fellowship of the Holy Spirit" (2Cor 13:13). We too, not only the bread and wine, are to be transformed. The Eucharist is not fully received unless God's love manifests itself in our daily lives. Something awesome is happening here! We are being drawn into the life of God at work within us.

Through him , and with him, and in him, O God, almighty Father, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all glory and honor is yours, for ever and ever. Amen!

Did You Know??

a-1, a-2, a-3 Waltzing with Mathilda ?

As we are now in a "summer" feel we will be using the "Waltz" feeling of the Schubert Mass. We learned the Holy, Holy, Holy, the Memorial Acclamation, and the Amen back in January and February. We will be singing this for the rest of June and all of July. We will be adding to this to complete the setting by adding the "Lamb of God" this weekend and next weekend.

The *Deutsche Messe* stems from a tradition of lowmasses, settings of religious texts in the vernacular languages in Austria and southern Germany. It was commissioned by Johann Philipp Neumann. Neumann was interested in simple music designed to appeal to "the widest possible congregation". Neumann wrote the German librettos, which Schubert scored in a block-chordal, (known as homophonic) style. This was very suitable for congregational singing. Schubert commenced the work in December 1826, completing and publishing it in 1827.

Schubert intended it for usage in Catholic Church services **BUT** censorship prevented this from taking place. Ah, it was not approved for liturgical use as it was an unauthorized German translation of the Mass. The work has since gained popularity and has been translated into numerous other languages.

The "Lamb of God" maintains that feel of a gentle waltz. Worried about new material and being able to sing it? Do you remember your first driving lesson? Generally, not very confident and much hesitation, but by the time you got your license you were confident and wanted to drive fast. Same as singing new music: at first you don't feel confident which makes it a challenge to sing but after many, many times it is easy, and you want to sing with gusto.

You will find the "Lamb of God" at No. 366B which is an insert in Gather. Please, always return this to this location for the next use. Many thanks and great singing!
