





Seeds for the Journey

In last week's Seeds article we briefly discussed the use of letter writing as an advocacy tool. To that end, you were encouraged to write a letter to one of our local Senators asking for their support for poverty-reducing international development and humanitarian assistance in Fiscal Year 2022. If you haven't begun that process, I invite you to do so. Understandably, you may be asking if such efforts are worth your time, thinking, perhaps, that politicians don't listen to their constituents. However, I can tell you from personal experience that politicians not only listen, they encourage their constituents to contact them with their concerns. Moreover, I can unequivocally say that advocacy works!

A case in point is the recently passed Global Child Thrive Act (GCTA). This new law mandates that early childhood development activities be integrated into relevant U.S. international humanitarian aid programs. These activities, centered on proper nutrition coupled with mental stimulation like singing and reading, support children's mental development while building their resilience to potential future challenges such as food insecurity. The law is especially important at a time when the livelihoods of children in marginalized countries are being impacted by the secondary effects of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The passage of the GCTA was accomplished because of a two year advocacy effort by a host of organizations, including the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops and Catholic Relief Services. The advocacy campaign included contacting representatives via letter writing, e-mail, phone conversations, and face to face visits. I participated in the latter three efforts.

Does advocacy work? Yes indeed! As one Senator from Pennsylvania related, he knew little of the GCTA until he was contacted by his constituents. He was glad they did and was proud to support the bill. As CRS executive Bill O'Keefe said, "Our supporters put their faith into action by advocating for this bill's passage. Their tireless efforts have shown us that by working together, we can help children worldwide achieve their God-given potential."

In keeping with last week's Seeds article, below is a sample letter advocating for support for humanitarian assistance in Fiscal Year 2022. Feel free to copy or use this letter as a resource at your convenience.

Advocacy Sample Letter

Dear Senator Schumer,

My name is..., and I am a parishioner at St. Paul's Catholic Church in Webster, NY. I am writing because I am concerned about the millions of people worldwide who suffer from poverty, hunger and poor nutrition, and the exacerbating effects COVID-19 has on those living under such conditions.

At a time when so many are suffering around the world I urge Congress to protect poverty-reducing international development and humanitarian assistance in Fiscal Year 2022. This is an issue that's very important to others in my parish as well. We look forward to hearing back from you on this issue. Please know that Catholic Relief Services and the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops can be a resource to you as you work on this issue in Congress.

Thank you for your attention to these issues. As a concerned citizen and a committed Catholic, I believe that we have an obligation to those who are suffering, whether they are our neighbors here at home, or our neighbors overseas.



Undie Sunday





REFLECT

FIRST READING

Moses and the ancient Israelites ratified the covenant God established with them at Mount Sinai with the blood of a sacrificed animal. The sacrificed animal affirmed Israel's commitment: "We will do everything the Lord has told us." Why do you think Israel tied sacrificed blood to their verbal commitment?

SECOND READING

The author of Hebrews teaches us that the sacrificed blood of Christ sanctifies us and offers us eternal redemption. How do you see this connected to ancient Israel's practice of sacrificing animals for their blood?

GOSPEL READING

Mark's account of the institution of the Eucharist is linked to the Jewish Feast of Unleavened Bread when a Passover lamb was sacrificed. What do you think Mark is teaching us in making this connection?
