



Seeds for the Journey

What a difference a year makes! Last year at this time the reality of the severity of the CIVID-19 pandemic was just beginning to take hold as positive cases and the number of deaths continued to rise. In response, Monroe County declared a state of emergency while the Diocese of Rochester suspended all Masses, including Easter, along with other diocesan and parish activities. At the same time, businesses and schools closed, social events were canceled, and major sporting events were either canceled or suspended. Moreover, as the country shut down, the economy retracted, while the stock market crashed to levels not seen in many years. Within a few short weeks life as we knew it changed dramatically; we experienced shortages of food and hygiene items, long lines at grocery stores, the loss of jobs, the death of loved ones, isolation from family members and friends, and hand washing, masks, and social distancing became the norm.

Today, Palm Sunday, marks the beginning of Holy Week. Last year at this time parishioners celebrated Holy Week via live streaming on Facebook, while Fr Paul and I celebrated Masses in a church full of empty seats. This year, however, we look forward to celebrating Holy Week, especially the Easter Triduum, in a church filled with parishioners. Yes, there will still be certain safety restrictions employed such as masks and social distancing, the elimination of the foot washing rite on Holy Thursday, and the absence of an open fire at the Easter Vigil Mass, but we still intend to celebrate Holy Week following liturgical norms as much as possible. This includes the presentation and blessing of the Sacred Oils and Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament on Holy Thursday, a non-contact veneration of the cross on Good Friday, the blessing and procession of the Paschal Candle at the Easter Vigil, and the renewal of baptismal vows and the sprinkling rite at all Easter Masses, including 8:00 and 10:00 A.M. Sunday morning. We invite everyone to sign-up on-line and join us.

Last year we began Holy Week with a great deal of fear, anxiety, and uncertainty as the pandemic raged unchecked all around us. This year there are signs of hope, and light, and life as the pandemic appears to be abating, people are returning to work, positive cases and deaths continue to decline, and millions of people are being vaccinated every day. While we still need to be vigilant, wear masks, and employ safety protocols, our celebration of the Paschal mystery this week brings with it the hope that we will soon rise from the darkness of the past year to a newness of life.

But even as we look forward to rising from the ashes of the COVID-19 pandemic, we need to keep in mind that there are millions of people around the world whose lives are still dramatically impacted by the COVID virus. Many developing countries lack the infrastructure to provide food, hygiene supplies, and medical care (including vaccinations) to infected populations. As we reflect this week on how Jesus emptied himself for our sake, perhaps we can also reflect on how we can empty ourselves for the sake of others. One way we can help others is through CRS Rice Bowl. Your contributions to Rice Bowl will make a difference in the lives of 159 million people in over 100 countries, including millions still suffering from the coronavirus pandemic.

As we come to the end of our Lenten journey you may be wondering what to do with your Rice Bowl. This year, due to safety concerns, we ask you **not** to return your Rice Bowls to church. Instead, we ask you to count the money in the Rice Bowl and either 1) write a check for that amount and place it in the envelope provided with the Rice Bowl and return the envelope to church, or 2) take advantage of the options available to pay online by going to our website at <u>www.stpaulsrcc.org</u>. You can also pay directly at <u>www.crsricebowl.org</u>. On behalf of CRS I want to thank you for your support and your continued willingness to serve the needs of our brothers and sisters around the world.

As we begin our celebration of Holy Week, may the Lord give us the strength to "stay awake" and pray with Jesus that the mystery of His dying and rising may become more deeply rooted in our lives.




