LENT, the Christian season of reflection, sacrifice, and service, is one of my favorite times of the liturgical year. As Faith Formation Coordinator years ago, I was challenged to convey the "Lent lesson" to the children in the catechetical programs. The tradition of "Burying the Alleluia" used in the catechetical program, <u>Catechesis of the Good Shepherd</u> proved to be the perfect answer.

During the entire 40 days of Lent, the word "Alleluia" is completely absent from the liturgy of the Church. "Alleluia", rooted in the Hebrew expression meaning "praise the Lord", is found in many of the Psalms and is associated with joy and celebration. That is why it is NEVER said during Lent, a time focused on the sacrifice of Jesus Christ on the cross. It is, however, a very important word, deserving of a proper send-off before resuming its use at the Easter Vigil. (Articles from USCCB.org and Aleteia.org)

Our students had beautifully decorated small paper banners containing the word "Alleluia" and placed them in a bejeweled chest. In a very solemn procession, the children walked the box to the stone baptismal font, that had been drained and filled with sand and stones, looking like a bleak desert, The parish liturgist dug a small hole and we all sang one last "Alleluia", then solemnly buried the chest, covering it with sand and rocks.

Throughout the weeks that followed, our children would come to Mass with their families, whispering as they walked in front of the font and pointing to "the spot" where the chest was buried. In class, we discussed how we were quietly changing ourselves through prayer, serving others, and "fasting" from a favorite thing. This memorable tradition became truly joyous when the "Alleluia" was brought back to life at Easter.

Now, years later as an older adult, I find Lent a time of prayerful reflection on my life, a deeper dive into my faith, and an examination of my relationship with others. The difficulties and challenges seem daunting at times, but I know St. Paul's has much to offer those in need. These 'buried treasures' remind me of those "Alleluias", unknown by some but waiting to bring the joyful presence of the Risen Christ into their lives. Here are opportunities available for the sick, the dying, and the bereaved in our families and circle of friends.

For those who are sick in body, mind, and spirit: call Parish office – 671-2100:

Our Lady of Compassion Ministry – Eucharistic Ministers who visit the Homebound and those in hospitals and nursing homes bringing them Holy Communion and a compassion presence.

Anointing of the Sick – Persons suffering from illness at home or hospitalized can be anointed by Fr. Paul. Call the parish office if you or family member desire to receive this sacrament.

Tuesdays at the 8:30 morning Mass- Fr. Paul anoints anyone in need of the sacrament of healing.

Prayer Shawl Ministry – Gifted volunteers who knit and crochet shawls and lap coverlets as they pray for the recipients of each work of love. Shawls and coverlets available upon request.

For those who have died: consult parish website stpaulsrcc.org/sacraments/funeral-planning

Funeral Planning – Assistance is provided to guide families through the process of planning a funeral liturgy for a loved one with the information found on the parish website and a personal meeting with a funeral coordinator.

Preplanning Funeral Your Own Funeral:

To plan your funeral liturgy in advance; choosing readings, hymns, that are meaningful to you while you are alive

To ease the stress and sadness of surviving family members during their time of grieving your death

Support to the Grieving:

Together in Grief – A grief support program meeting monthly on Thursday mornings provides a caring listening environment for those grieving the loss of a loved one

Funeral Team – Compassionate volunteers who assist at funeral liturgies as greeters, ushers, acolytes, sacristans

Martha Ministry – Generous volunteers who provide warm, welcoming receptions following funeral liturgies

Finally, throughout these 40 days of Lent, my prayer for all of us is that as we strive to follow Christ's will for us, we keep in mind the promise of the buried "Alleluias". Let us pray in gratitude for our parish as we prepare our hearts for the joyful resurrection of our Savior.

First Sunday of Lent



Over the Jubilee Year we will explore the themes of Hope, Pilgrimage, and Jubilee, always ending with a question for you to consider over the week.

Jesus in today's Gospel undertakes a pilgrimage of sorts. His journey through temptation prepares him for his public ministry. It truly is an outward journey reflecting an inner movement.

Ponder Point: How can you make this Lent a pilgrimage? In other words, what inner movement are you undertaking this Lent?



Question to the editor: Dear editor, how can we practice Almsgiving during Lent?

Almsgiving is one of the three traditional practices of the season of Lent; prayer, and fasting are the other two. Almsgiving in this context is contributing financially to those in need. Some parishes employ a means whereby the donation is given to assist the parish in the care of the poor. Here at St Paul's, we do the Catholic Relief Services Rice Bowl collection, Good Sam does a Lenten Food Drive, and the School of Religion and Confirmation programs will also do their own Lenten Collections. However, everyone has the ability to relieve the needs of those who are underprivileged through their local parish, diocesan or community shelters and soup kitchens. This can be done through a monetary or material contributions. When we give up certain foods, things and activities for Lent, the money we would have spent on those foods or things should be kept and then put together and given to the poor or to those in need during Easter. In effect, each person can do their own individual Lenten collections. Individuals can also decide to donate more to their weekly church contributions.

Father Dave Pivonka Hiking the Camino 500 Miles with Jesus

Fans of the movie "The Way", starring Martin Sheen, will enjoy reading Father Dave's memoir of his walk along El *Camino de Composte*la, the ancient pilgrim path to the tomb of Saint James the Apostle in Santiago in northwestern Spain. In this book he details the physical reality of walking every day for thirty-one days, life along the El Camino, encounters with other pilgrims – the lessons learned from his time with them – and reflections from his own contemplation and prayers. He opens his heart and shares deep revelations, as well as humor, from his pilgrimage. His first lesson learned came in relation to the weight of his pack. He was so concerned with it until he finally realized that maybe that is where he needed to begin. "Lord, perhaps this is where we begin. Not with my pack but with my heart, my very life. What is it that you want me to get rid of? How do you want to empty *me?* What excess luggage am I carrying in my soul?" His Camino hike holds real lessons for your own life's journey.
