



Office Update

Our CMA Shortage challenge was a wonderful success! Many thanks to the Challengers who started it and the parishioners who responded.

Thank you also to everyone who donated directly to the CMA! Between the initial CMA donations and the Challenge donations, we have made our goal! We couldn't have done it without you. Thank you!

Our roof leak is fixed and we are watching to make sure additional leaks don't occur. This wet spring has kept Ben busy with more inside projects than outdoors. Good news...he hopes to install the last order of bricks that were on hold. Keep an eye on our walkway!

We now have three masses per weekend, 4:00 PM Saturday and 9:00AM and 11:00 AM on Sunday.

We are still doing signups for the weekend masses. It makes it much easier for Helen and our ushers to seat everyone quickly and safely. Thanks for helping them by signing up!

You may have noticed the Saturday signup is locked at 4:00 PM on Thursday. This is because Sign Up Genius cuts it off two days in advance of the event. (We are using the cheap version, not the deluxe which has more flexibility but costs significantly more.) I generally take the signup button off the website Thursday evening when I make up the final attendance/seating group lists for Helen and Ben. Ben sets up the chairs on Friday morning and Helen uses the lists to assist the ushers and greeters at each Mass. She also references the lists to know who needs to complete the volunteer forms.

We know everyone is getting tired of the signups and masks and social distancing. We are too. (I'd rather watch Netflix than do seating lists on Thursday nights). However, while more of us have received the Covid vaccine, many have not and are still at risk. Also the vaccine is not 100% effective. We are continuing to follow CDC guidelines for best practices which include masks, social distancing and sanitizing. Thanks for your patience and understanding as we try to do our best to keep everyone safe.

The office is still closed to visitors but you may still reach us via phone and email. Jodie checks in with many folks each week when she calls them to sign them up. Recognizing God in Your Ordinary Moments "Branching Out Isn't Always What It's Cracked Up to Be"

"That's a really beautiful tree branch. Man, would you look at the bark on that thing? The others are real duds, but that low-hanging branch has really got it all together."

I've never heard anyone say this. Maybe I just need to hang out with more arborists, but I can't recall ever hearing someone admire the particular beauty of a single branch. When someone comments on a tree, it's usually the whole tree — perhaps a visual element of it, like the color of the leaves or its height. But people don't usually zero in on one branch.

Maybe that's because usually, if one branch is looking a little weak, chances are every other branch is, too.

The Bible tells us that when we bear fruit as good everyday stewards, it is for the Father's glory. We are the branch on His magnificent tree. What we have is from Him, and what we do likewise points back to Him. We also tend to reflect how well the other branches around us are incorporating the nutrients coming their way. That's all fine and good in theory. In practice, it can be an arduous exercise in humility.


When I do something virtuous or charitable or kind, there is a part of me that wants to stand out for it. I think that's true for all of us. We've given of ourselves in some way or overcome some human temptation to accomplish a little bit of good in this world, and even though we know God sees us, we'd really love for everyone else to see it, too.

It's a struggle, for sure. But we need to remember that our fruit belongs to the whole tree.

Whoever remains in me and I in him will bear much fruit, because without me you can do nothing." (Jn 15:5)


