Christ has Chosen Us

We are celebrating the sixth Sunday of Easter. We have just two weeks left for the Easter season. Yes, *tempus fugit* (time flies). Easter Sunday was like yesterday, but the reality is that we are approaching two important feasts celebrated towards the end of the Easter Season. On Thursday, the entire Church will celebrate the Solemnity of the Ascension of the Lord. This solemn feast is celebrated 40 days after Easter. In two Sundays, we shall celebrate the coming of the Holy Spirit in the Solemnity of the Pentecost. Pentecost Sunday is usually considered as the birthday of the Church. It also marks the end of the Easter Season.

The Gospel reading of today's Liturgy talks about the commandment to love one another as God as loved us. We call this in theology the double love command. My Master's thesis in theology was partially focused on this. What is love? The angelic doctor, St Thomas Aquinas, defines love as effectively willing the good of another. If I love someone, I will always will the good for that person even if it comes at my detriment. That is the challenge Jesus is giving us. Because Jesus loves us so much, He does not call us slaves but friends. As His friends, Christ has commissioned us to go out and bear fruit. Christ tells each and every one of us: "it was not you who chose me but I who chose you and appointed you to go out and bear fruit, fruit that will last." This is also a challenge to remain faithful to Him by what we say, do our act.

By our Baptism Christ has called each of us and has commissioned us to go and be His disciples in the world. Our daily activities and interactions are supposed to mirror that call to discipleship. The commissioning by Christ for His disciples to go out and bear fruit and to love one another, fits perfectly with out parish celebrations today. Those from our parish who received the sacrament of Confirmation on Wednesday will receive their Confirmation acertificates during the 9am Mass this Sunday. At the 11am Mass on Sunday, 9 children will receive their First Holy Communion. It will be the very first time they will receive the Body of Jesus. By receiving Communion, they too are called to be Jesus to the world. Even though they offered themselves up to receive these sacraments, it is God who takes the initiative and calls each one by name. Let us pray for these 18 parishioners that by receiving these sacraments, they may recommit their lives to Jesus and continue to configure themselves to Him. May they love one another as God loves them and may they go out and bear fruit.

Come Holy Spirit; Do not delay!



You are invited to join the Rosary Group for weekly prayer every Tuesday, at Noon in the worship area. All are welcome.




May the Month of the Blessed Virgin Mary

Father, we praise You through Jesus Christ Your Son in the love of Your Spirit, for ever and ever. Amen.




Everyday Stewardship

It was a song that came out in the Vietnam War era and during somewhat of a hippie revolution, but perhaps the words belong to no real moment in time. They are simply the commands of Jesus.

Saint of the Week



Harper, George Lea Living with Dying

George Harper, an ordained minister in the United Methodist Church, had lived with cancer for many years. His cancer had no viable cure; he knew it would probably kill him at an early age. He also knew that many people were like him, living with a chronic major illness. So he wrote this book to demonstrate what role Christian faith plays in the lives of those who are living with dying. Through endless rounds of chemotherapy, hospitalizations, low blood counts, and periodic CAT scans, Reverend Harper was forced to confront his own mortality, keep his life in perspective, and focus on each day, one at a time. He drew comfort from reading the gospels, especially about Jesus' creative living in the shadow of the cross. Sadly, he passed away at the age of 48. (Call no. 362.1-HAR)
