



The Diocese has launched the 2020-2021 Catholic Ministries Appeal campaign. Our parish goal this year is \$109,477. However, we have an opportunity to lower this; if we raise our participation rate from 21% to 25%, we will receive a grant of \$3,200. So we need everyone to donate!

Coffee and Catholicism "Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love"

Our third Coffee and Catholicism session will be on November 3 from 9:15-10:45 a.m. in the worship area. If you have not already attended a session, please know that these sessions are largely interactive and based on the USCCB's "Open Wide Our Hearts" and "Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship. This session will follow up on the October 13 session on "Open Wide Our Hearts." We will uncover what each of us can do to interrupt racism in our families, workplaces and nearby communities.

Ellen Santora, Ph.D., will facilitate the session. Masks and social distancing are required. Coffee will not be available, although you can bring your own. Treats are not allowed in the worship space. Attendance at the first session is not necessary. Each session stands alone.


Help Wanted




