Seeds for the Journey

Zacchaeus and Receiving Jesus with Joy

The Gospel of Luke presents Jesus as the one who seeks and finds the lost. I'm sure you can recall the three consecutive stories of the lost sheep, the coin and the Prodigal Son (Luke 15:4-32). Each time, after finding what was lost, there is great joy and celebration.

In today's gospel, Jesus proclaims he "has come to seek and to save what was lost" (Luke 19:10). Jesus passing through a town spots Zacchaeus perched up in a tree and invites himself to stay at his house. Jesus loves and accepts Zacchaeus, the chief tax collector, just as he finds him. However, to the astonished grumbling crowd, Jesus had just invited himself into the home of a sinner. Zacchaeus without hesitation comes down and receives Jesus with joy.

Conversion follows Zacchaeus' encounter with Jesus. His response was to turn to his neighbors, the poor and those he had wronged. He freely repents, pledging to give lavishly to care for the needy and make amends to those he has extorted. We too are capable of repent-ance and reconciliation. Yet first and foremost, this story shows us what can happen when we know ourselves as unconditionally loved. A relationship with Jesus *will* make a difference in our actions. Even though we are unworthy, Jesus will seek us out and come to stay with us. He invites us to see ourselves anew, the way God sees us - with mercy and love.

We may encounter Jesus in many ways, but most certainly we receive Jesus in the Eucharist. As we receive communion today we welcome Jesus into our hearts. We freely accept his invitation to abide with us no matter what "grumbling" is going on within or around us. "Lord, I am not worthy, but I am beloved. I am yours."

So go out on a limb to encounter Jesus. Experience the gaze of Jesus looking with love and acceptance upon you. Then like Zacchaeus you will respond to Jesus with joy.

"You looked with love upon me and deep within your eyes imprinted grace; this mercy set me free, held in your love's embrace, to lift my eyes adoring to your face."

Seeing her friend 🕺 the trash collector, Mother Maria's plans with him to use his trash cans to save the little ones. This story of courage and bravery is based on true accounts of Mother Maria, now a saint in the Orthodox Christian Church.
