As we celebrate the World Mission Sunday, it is good to remember that Blessed Virgin Mary was the first missionary who took the joy of Good News to Elizabeth, Zechariah and John the Baptist. When John heard the good news he leaped for joy in his mother's womb, and Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, cried out in a loud voice and said, "Most blessed are you among women, and blessed is the fruit of your womb..."(Luke 1:39-45). Throughout her life and in her glorious Assumption, Mary points the way to Jesus and God the Father.

Mary is capable of interceding and intervening for us as she did for the wedding couple in Cana of Galilee as reported by John 2:1-12. Hence, turning to Our Lady during pandemic is important. That is why the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops, consecrated the United States to the maternal care of the Blessed Virgin Mary on May 1. Similar initiatives have taken place in other countries. For us here at St. Paul's church, it was timely and fitting to create a Mary's shrine at the corner with votive candles and a statue of Our Lady of Lourdes. When you come to church for mass, please remember to visit our Mother's Corner, say a prayer, light a candle and there are envelopes for donations.

October 7<sup>th</sup> was Memorial of Our Lardy of Rosary and the whole month is dedicated to Mary and hence praying rosary and other devotions are encouraged. These devotions give us the opportunity to pray for Our Lady's continued protection of us all, healing of the sick and the Holy Spirit to guide those working to get more vaccines and drugs to treat Covid-19 pandemic. The effects of this virus still cause unprecedented challenges in all aspects of life including the Church's life and mission. But we will go through these challenges with the help of Mary.

St. Bernard was absolutely certain that Mary comes to the assistance of those who call on her in times of danger and need as he said: "In danger, in distress, in uncertainty, think of Mary, call upon Mary. She never leaves your lips, she never departs from your heart; and so that you may obtain the help of her prayers, never forget the example of her life. If you follow her, you cannot falter; if you pray to her, you cannot despair; if you think of her, you cannot err. If she sustains you, you will not stumble, if she protects you, you have nothing to fear, if she guides you, you will never grow weary; if she shows you favor, you will attain your goal."

May we follow her example by being obedient to God's will, being humble, loving, and trusting in God's mercy and goodness. Just as God worked through her obedience to bring her Son into the world, so He can work through us to bring God's love, healing and goodness to those around us. Mary's assumption into heaven (celebrated on August 15<sup>th</sup>), indicates that as followers of her son Jesus Christ, we, too, shall be brought to heaven after our death, to celebrate a life of eternal joy.

### Coffee & Catholicism "Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship" & "Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love"

Coffee and Catholicism is participating in a diocesan-wide reflection on two documents published by the USCCB (United States Conference of Catholic Bishops): "Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love" and "Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship." These documents focus on the role of the faithful in resolving issues that plague our society.

Deacon Mark Robbins will facilitate the second session from 9:15 until 10:45 am on October 27, in the worship space, wearing masks, and socially distancing. Those who come will reflect on "Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship," a document that examines the role of Catholics in resolving global and national issues including voting in national, state, county and local elections. Key ideas will include: Catholic social teaching, the primacy of love, our personal responsibilities, role of the Church, and **the** do's and don'ts of Catholic political participation especially regarding elections.

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### Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship

In their statement on Forming Consciences for Faithful Citizenship, the U.S. Catholic bishops lift up various issues of different moral weight and urgency. Some issues they mention include: abortion, euthanasia, the use of the death penalty and imprudent resort to war; protecting the fundamental understanding of marriage as the life-long and faithful union of one man and one woman; achieving comprehensive immigration reform; caring for our common home and addressing climate change; helping families and children overcome poverty; providing healthcare while respecting human life, human dignity and religious freedom; establishing and complying with moral limits on the use of military force. In their 2018 pastoral against racism, the Bishops call us to be aware of the sin of racism and systemic racism in our society. For reflection: What do the bishops mean when they say, "Both opposing evil and doing good are essential obligations"? Why are both (not just one or the other) important for Catholics?

### Open Wide Our Hearts: The Enduring Call to Love

"Racism comes in many forms. It can be seen in deliberate, sinful acts. In recent times, we have seen bold expressions of racism by some groups as well as individuals. The reappearance of symbols of hatred, such as nooses and swastikas in public spaces, is a tragic indicator of rising racial and ethnic animus. All too often, Hispanic and African Americans face discrimination in hiring, housing, educational opportunities, and incarceration. Racial profiling frequently targets Hispanics for selective immigration enforcement practices, and African Americans for suspected criminal activity. There is also growing fear and harassment of persons from majority Muslim countries. Extreme nationalist ideologies are feeding the American public discourse with xenophobic rhetoric that instigates fear against foreigners, immigrants, and refugees. Finally, too often racism comes in the form of the sin of omission, when individuals, communities, and even churches remain silent and fail to act against racial injustice when it is encountered."

At that Jesus said to them, "Then repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God." (Mt 22:21b)


