

Seeds for the Journey

This week we observe World Mission Sunday, where Catholics world-wide are asked to support our mission priests, religious and lay leaders whose life-work is providing loving service to those most in need. Pope Francis has set October 2019 as an Extraordinary Missionary Month to foster greater awareness of "missio ad gentes" and to animate the missionary transformation of Church life and pastoral activity. He has asked each country to highlight a great missionary who shared their life for the love of the Gospel. In the U.S.A., we have chosen Sister Dorothy Stang, SNDdeN, who was martyred in Brazil in 2005 because of her defense of Indigenous people and the Environment. Her story is challenging and inspirational.

As an ordinary woman living in Webster, I am in awe of the women and men who devote their lives risking death in foreign lands to serve the poor and seek justice. Sometimes I feel like I'm not doing my part to further the Kingdom of God. St. Therese of the Child Jesus or the Little Flower as she's fondly remembered, felt the same way at a time in her life. When she entered the convent of Carmel at an early age, Therese was determined to become a saint. At first, she wanted to win souls for Christ as a missionary, but eventually she came to the realization that to attain holiness and express her love for God, she didn't have to do heroic acts or great deeds.

St. Theresa's realization struck me as I recently encountered and experienced stories of "missionaries" living regular lives, doing extraordinary things. Let me share a few with you.

A while ago, my daughter Gina, her husband and her friends were enjoying a night out at a favorite Minneapolis restaurant when she was approached by a friendly outgoing woman whom she had never met. The woman, Louise, had recognized her as someone who attends the same church as she. As the conversation and the evening progressed, Louise invited my daughter to consider attending a women's retreat that she was involved with, that would take place on a workday at the University that my daughter had attended. Gina didn't commit to the retreat and put the idea to rest since she was working. At Mass, on subsequent Sundays, Louise would make it a point to greet Gina, engage her in friendly banter and invite her again to join the retreat.

Long story short, Gina invited a friend, took the day off and drove over an hour to the retreat. The experience was "unbelievable", bringing together women of all ages and backgrounds. The attendees shared life stories, prayed together, and enjoyed unconditional fellowship. The outcome provided the participants a sense of solidarity, peace of mind and knowledge of the love and generosity of God.

Louise...a missionary amongst us.

On Tuesday, October 1, the feast of St. Therese of the Child Jesus, as I browsed through Facebook posts, I read a post written by a young woman. Her entry was difficult to read but inspiring since October is also Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness Month and Respect Life Month for Catholics. The writer spoke of how after a long struggle to conceive her second child, she had joyfully found out she was going to have twins. Things were going well but then complications arose, sadly causing the death of both of her babies and endangering her own life as well. In her grief she found she didn't want to talk about the loss, but somehow found the courage to finally share her experience. Her wish was that through the sharing of her story she could help to raise awareness about the pain and loss of an unborn child and to erase the secrecy that often accompanies such occurrences. Her heartbreaking story inspired others who had suffered similar tragedies to offer words of comfort, understanding, and prayers. Through their collective pain came a glimmer of hope. **Grieving young mother...a missionary among us.**

During a recent Confirmation class, I sat back and watched as young people, many of whom didn't know one another, interacted with one another. Their openness and friendliness was evident as they shared their stories, delighted in similarities, laughed and prayed. The gestures of youth reaching out of their comfort zones to make others feel welcome and comfortable touched my heart and set the stage for a fantastic encounter with the Holy Spirit.

Confirmation students...missionaries among us.

Each of us, as baptized followers of Jesus Christ, fed by His Word and strengthened by His Body and Blood can do heroic things in our ordinary lives. As St. Therese said, "May you use those gifts that you have received and pass on the love that has been given to you." Let us support and pray for the missions and as we leave Mass today, remember **YOU ARE NOW ENTERING THE MISSION FIELDS**

Martin, S.J., James James Martin: Essential Writings

Father Martin, the editor at large of *America* magazine and former chaplain of The Colbert Report, is one of the most popular authors in the John Walsh Library, which has many of his books available to borrow. He will be speaking at Nazareth College on November 7 at 7:00 p.m. This compilation, drawn from his articles, books, and online writings, would be a good introduction to his work. He offers reflections, insights and advice on everything from prayer to married holiness to depression to sexuality to finding one's own path to holiness. He often draws on his own experiences-surgery, travel, frustration, family—as he contemplates his own pilgrim journey. Intriguing chapter titles include "Don't Be a Jerk," "Saintly Bad Behavior," and "Holy Dirt."
