



Seeds for the Journey

Every year in October, the Catholic Church in the United States observes Respect Life Month, and this first weekend is designated as Respect Life Sunday. The church gives us a chance to understand and value the gift of all human life. She helps us build a culture that cherishes and protects life in all stages. This year we highlight the witness of St. Joseph as a defender of life. The Holy Father Pope Francis invites us to reflect more deeply on how St. Joseph loved Jesus with a father's heart. He faithfully followed God's will in accepting and lovingly protecting the child Jesus and Blessed Mother Mary.

In the Scriptures, we read about the angel appeared to St. Joseph in a dream and told him to accept Mary even though she was pregnant. He guided and provided for Mary on the road to Bethlehem. He welcomed the baby Jesus as his own son in a humble stable and loved Him. When the life of baby Jesus was threatened by King Herod, Joseph took the infant Jesus and Mary and fled to Egypt to protect Him. St. Joseph taught Jesus a lot of things, not only making wooden stuff as a carpenter but also religious values, love and respect of human beings.

During this Respect Life Month, we can follow St. Joseph example of respecting and protecting the sacred dignity of every single human being in all circumstances. We are challenged to bear witness to our own call as Christians to safeguard God's gift of human life. Today's first reading from the book of Genesis tell us something very import about our Creator. God created the first human being Adam from the dust of the earth but then He sensed Adam loneliness that was "not good." So, God created for Adam a life partner called Eve and blessed them to multiply. God's actions in creation come from the Creator's love for the human being.

As we contemplate Respect Life Sunday, we realize there is a moral obligation for the care of every living thing in "our common home" and to respect human life in all stages from conception to natural death. We are to reject threats to human life and dignity such as abortion, homicide, euthanasia, doctor assisted suicide, capital punishment, unjust war, economic injustice, racism and the environmental crisis. When pregnant women or parenting mothers are in difficult circumstances, when some people are afraid that they might be a burden or feel like their lives don't matter, may we faithfully respond with care and love like St. Joseph. And we ask St. Joseph the defender of life to pray for us.

October beside being Respect Life is the month of the Holy Rosary dedicated to Blessed Virgin Mary. *Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death, Amen!*


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


Saint of the Week

St. Francis of Assisi (1181 – 1226) left a life of luxury for a life devoted to Christianity after reportedly hearing the voice of God, who commanded him to rebuild the Christian church and live in poverty. He founded the men's Order of Friars Minor, the women's Order of St. Clare, the Third Order of St. Francis and the Custody of the Holy Land.

Born in 1181 in Italy, St. Francis of Assisi was renowned for drinking and partying as a youth. During a military expedition/ battle between Assisi and Perugia, he was captured and imprisoned for ransom. He spent nearly a year in prison and began receiving visions from God. After his release from prison, St. Francis of Assisi claimed to have heard the voice of Christ, who told him to restore the Christian Church and live a life of poverty. As a result, St. Francis of Assisi abandoned his life of luxury and became a devotee of the Catholic faith.

Today, St. Francis of Assisi, known for his deep love of nature and animals, is the patron saint of the environment and animals. Each October, many animals are blessed on his feast day.
