Seeds for the Journey

As Barbara and I were taking our usual neighborhood evening walk the other day, we both looked up at a towering Maple tree and commented about how the leaves had already begun to change color; many of them already on the ground. What we both knew subconsciously was becoming visibly obvious - summer was quickly giving way to autumn. As we looked at one another we collectively wondered where the time had gone.

This year the transition to autumn officially begins on September 22. Most of us, though, don't need an official announcement to know what our senses are already telling us - the winds of change are upon us. This change, however, involves much more than the color of the leaves. This is traditionally the beginning of a new school year; a time for students to meet new teachers, catch up with friends not seen since June, and begin to engage in sports and other extra-curricular activities. This year, however, the sights, sounds, smells, and activities that characterize the transition to the season of autumn, are colored by the stain of the COVID-19 crisis. This year, the autumn season, so often filled with hopeful anticipation, begins with a sense of fear and uncertainty as students, parents, teachers, and administrators grapple with changes and restrictions deemed necessary to keep everyone safe and healthy. For most, these changes involve various combinations of virtual and on-campus instruction, combined with either cancelation or postponement of extra-curricular programs. Navigating these and other changes will be difficult and undoubtedly stressful for all.

In spite of the many challenges we face as we begin this new school year I think it is important for us not to allow the stress of uncertainty to overwhelm the beauty of the season. Make it a point to breathe in the cool, crisp autumn air; take a walk in the park and feel the leaves crunching under your feet; take a drive in the country and observe the kaleidoscope of reds, oranges, yellows, and browns that mark the season; visit a farmer's market or a near-by country store and take in the aroma of fresh baked apple or grape pie, and don't forget to bring home some apple cider and doughnuts.

Yes, this autumn we will travel a path we have never traveled before. But the beauty and majesty of the season remind us that God, our creator, is with us and will guide us every step of the way. As the summer season comes to a close please join me in reciting the following CRS prayer asking God to give us a spirit of peace as we begin this new and unfamiliar autumn journey together.

Father, Creator of all,

Thank you for these late summer days, for the warmth of the sun, the hours of daylight and the beauty around me.

Thank you for the ability to revel in the beauty of your creation, and the time to share it with family and friends.

May the somewhat slower pace of this time of year allow me to see you more vividly in the world around me and draw me closer to you (as this summer season ends.)

Teach me how to pray with wonder and awe at the world around me, no matter where I am or what I am doing.

Warm my soul with the continued gift of your presence and guide my feet with the light of your love.

As I stand surrounded by your creation, create in me a pure heart, O Lord!






